Creative Curriculum

Every Child Really Does Matter

It is important to us that every child is valued and that their own unique qualities are recognised. Our curriculum is differentiated to meet their individual needs to ensure that all children make progress. Appropriate special needs provision and enrichment for able children enables all the children to strive for their potential and have high aspirations.

Early Years

In Reception we are all about having fun! Playing and learning is at the heart of everything we do. We motivate the children with a range of exciting topics. The children have a wonderful time following fairy trails, finding a nest full of dinosaur eggs or discovering that a friendly alien has crash landed on our field! We enhance children's play by setting up activities around Year R that link to our topic. This enables children to learn and develop new knowledge and skills in an independent and enjoyable way. Alongside this, adult led tasks and carpet time for phonics and maths, supports children in making great progress.

In Reception, children follow the Early Years Foundation Stage Curriculum and work towards the Early Learning Goals, which are the final assessment of their Early Years Education.

The curriculum covers the following areas:


- Personal, Social and Emotional development

By working closely with our feeder nurseries and pre-schools, combined with our excellent transition programme, we ensure that children settle quickly and happily into school life. The children free-flow between the two Year R classrooms and our lovely outside area. This means that all of the cohort get to spend time with each other and our passionate Early Years staff, making us one big happy Year R family!











National Curriculum

The children in Year 1 to Year 6 follow the subjects in the National Curriculum.

The core subjects

- English
- Mathematics
- Science
- ICT
- RE

The foundation subjects

- History
- Geography
- Design and Technology
- Art
- Music
- PE
- PDL (Personal, Development, Learning)
- French

There is a focus on the core skills of English and Mathematics to provide the children with a secure foundation in these key areas. However we believe that the curriculum should be broad, balanced and purposeful. Curriculum areas therefore are often linked into projects; creating opportunities to

inspire and motivate the children. Project are based around a 'hook' to engage the children's interest, have opportunities for child initiated learning and often have a specific audience for the end of the project.

We recognise the importance of finding a balance between social, creative, physical and academic development in primary age children to work hard to achieve this.



Outdoor Education

Outdoor Classroom

Children learn most effectively, and are inspired, by first-hand experience. Educational visits and use of our extensive school grounds are integral parts of our curriculum. Day trips are regularly organised throughout all year groups and the school grounds are frequently used for a variety of different and stimulating learning experiences. Junior age children visit Captain Phillimore's woods, a private wood, regularly throughout each year. The children's final visit in Year 6 is to create their own bivouac shelters and sleep out in the woods, a highly memorable and unique experience.

There is an excellent programme of residential visits:

- Year 3 overnight camp on the school field.
- Year 4 stay in Minstead in the New Forest for three days.
- Year 5 visit Swanage in Dorset for four days.
- Year 6 spend five days in the Brecon Beacons in Wales.

This programme encourages the children's social and emotional development whilst also providing them with exciting experiences and wonderful memories. These visits are always eagerly anticipated and well appreciated by pupils and parents.

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Church School

A school with a Christian ethos

As a Church of England school we aim to provide a reflective environment where children develop social, spiritual and moral awareness together with a sense of selfesteem, respect and understanding for others. Our School values of Honesty, Charity and Respect are core to our everyday learning behaviours and ethos. We have close links with St Barnabas church and are well supported by the Church Team. Junior age children attend the church each week and each class leads services during the course of the year.



Extra-curriculm Activities

A great variety of lunch time and after school clubs are provided for the children to participate in and they greatly enrich school life. Most of the clubs are run voluntarily by staff and parents in their own time, for which there is no fee. However some are run by external providers who charge for their services. The activities vary according to the time of year and interests of the staff and parents.

Peripatetic music lessons from Hampshire Music Service are also offered to the children during school time including brass, violin, cello, guitar and recorders.

All children in Years 3 and 4 participate in Hampshire Music Service's Listen to Me programme. This means that across two years each child will have specialist music teaching enabling them to experience and learn the basics of up to six musical instruments. Weekly hour long lessons are provided and the children not only learn about each instrument but also build up to a termly performance for the whole school and parents.

The Listen to Me programme allows children to experience music in a group setting at first hand and often gives them a taste for learning a musical instrument.

Many opportunities are provided for the children to participate and compete in musical and sporting competitions with school teams and performers experiencing great success in a variety of events. Productions are performed throughout the school year by Reception, Years 1 and 2, Year 4 and Year 6.



Working Together

Home-School Agreement

Research has proven that parents are the most significant influence on their child's education. We are proud of our commitment to working with parents in order to maximise opportunities and to enable each child to achieve the best that they can.

We know that children are not always forthcoming about school so we provide other opportunities for parents to learn about the work their child is doing. These include a termly newsletter of work to be covered during each term, letters home, a class assemblies, open afternoons and parent's meetings.

Communication is further enhanced through regular newsletters and by e-mailing all letters directly to parents, a very useful and well used system.

Parent Evenings and Reports

Parents are invited, twice a year, to meet their child's teacher. They can look at displays of work around the school as well as their own child's books and folders. Teachers are willing to arrange further meetings out of these times to deal with specific issues. A report of the

children's progress in English and maths is given out each term. The final report includes achievement in the other subjects and a teacher's comment.

Parents of Year R children receive a report towards the end of the Summer Term. At the end of the school year, parents of Year 6 will receive the results of their Standard Assessment Tasks (SATs) completed at the end of Key Stages 1 and 2 of the National Curriculum.



Helping in School

Many parents assist in school and we welcome all offers of help. Parents may work in classrooms, hear readers, help on school visits, transport children to sporting competitions and much more. If you wish to do this, please speak to your child's teacher and complete a DBS form from the school office. It is an excellent way to get to know the school better.

Homework

We find that homework, supported with positive involvement by parents, complements and extends classroom learning and helps establish good working habits in the children.

Children are encouraged to complete homework from Year 1 to Year 6. The amount of homework increases as the children progress through the school and includes activities

such as reading, learning spellings, maths and project work. Friends of Swanmore Primary School (FOSPS)
